"The Fifth Gospel..."

When the Israelites escaped from Egypt—when the family of Jacob left that foreign land—² the land of Judah became God's sanctuary, and Israel became his kingdom.

– Psalm 114:1-2 (NLT)

Dear members & friends of Trinity UMC,

Last month, I challenged all of you to read through the New Testament with me in 2016. Now, if you've ever read the New Testament before—even a portion of it, you probably already know that it begins with the four gospels (technically, three synoptic gospels, and John). The word gospel, of course, means 'good news' ... and what a great way to begin this New Testament we are reading together!

This month, I'd like to talk about what's come to be known as 'the fifth gospel'. Now, I'm not speaking of the New York Times best selling novel by Ian Caldwell (2015) of the same name. What I'm speaking of is what I was taught back in 1996, on my first trip to Israel, by our guide— Malcolm Cartier. (I believe the phrase was coined by a Catholic priest visiting the Holy Land many years back, but I cannot seem to find the original author of this phrase.) Malcolm taught us that 'the fifth gospel' is the people and the land of Israel—the Holy Land. The significance of 'the fifth gospel' is this: There is no way we can really come to a solid understanding of the four gospels of the New Testament, if we haven't experienced the people and the land that it speaks of. After a half-dozen trips there, I'm inclined to agree.

I appreciate so much those who've taken my challenge seriously to read through the New Testament in 2016. For me, that means they're serious about their relationship with God—serious about growing in their faith and willing to be deliberate about that. But what if you could add to the experience of reading through the New Testament ... by actually seeing personally the people and the land of the New Testament? How would that begin to shape your knowledge and love of God's word? How

would that change your faith in Jesus Christ and, thus, your relationship with God? With all of this in mind, I'd like to challenge you to pray about something else. In January of 2017, I'll be leading a group to the Holy Land to introduce them to 'the fifth gospel'—the people and the land of Israel. Would you like to be a part of that?

Being a pastor called 'to make disciples for Jesus Christ for the transformation of the world', I cannot think of a better way to help individuals grow in their faith—to grow as disciples of Jesus. Let me encourage you to continue to get into God's word and read through the New Testament with me this year (reading schedule in newsletter each month at www.trinityunitedmethodistchurchlomira.com).

Then, as you're reading about people and places in the New Testament, take a moment to imagine being there—actually walking where Jesus walked. Folks, there's nothing like it; there's nothing that will help accelerate your spiritual growth like experiencing 'the fifth gospel'. Pray about joining me next January on my 7th trip to the Holy Land—'God's sanctuary' and 'God's kingdom'. And keep an eye out on our brand new website (above) for more information in the very near future...

The Season of Lent 2016 at Trinity UMC

Following is the upcoming schedule for Lent 2016. Please note *carefully* the following details about the schedule for Lent this year:

The Heart of the Matter

This January Patti Cobb's daughter, Kelsey, who is a senior at Bellin School of Nursing, had the opportunity to do a week long medical missions trip in Guatemala. While there her group, which included 13 students and 3 instructors, had the opportunity to visit the local children's hospital, dump, and two local villages to provide medical care to the people they met.

While in the villages the students and nursing instructors (two of which are Nurse Practitioners), along with two Guatemalan Doctors, and three Guatemalan Dentists, were able to put on clinics for the people of the villages to get free health and dental care. They served roughly 300 people during these clinics and those they served were very appreciative.

Some of the people that came to the clinics had to walk over two hours to receive care. Some of the services Kelsey provided included fluoride varnishes, examinations, wound care and assistance with musculoskeletal issues. The team of students also taught about nosocomial infections, proper hand washing techniques and how to make homemade pedialite for rehydration. One day they went shopping for food and then delivered it to three families in one of the villages. The trip to the Puerto Barrios dump was eye-opening. Over 300 people live in the dump.

Kelsey has always had a heart for missions, and this was a wonderful opportunity to serve God through medical treatment. This trip has shown her the ways in which she can serve as a nurse and is looking forward to future medical trips to serve those who don't have access to medical care.

SACRIFICE PART V (CONCLUSION)

Mom, worried and lonesome, was nearly crushed with the responsibility of renting a home, buying a car and furniture, re-learning how to drive, managing the three of us kids, budgeting, and worst of all, traveling to several states, serving as keynote speaker at week-long evangelical "camps", In one letter she mentioned seven speeches in four days. She had suffered from allergies and asthma most of her life and Dad was worried about her health. And he was deeply lonesome.

As the summer approached autumn, Dad's life had become increasingly difficult. He could no longer move about freely, visiting the churches where native pastors needed help nor could he even teach in his own mission school. Permits, required and filled out in Japanese then processed by the Government or the police or by both, were required for a countless number of activities such as withdrawing one's own money from the bank; selling personal belongings (clothing, furniture, even our small mountain cabin); purchasing staples and fresh foods (usually not available); going from one part of the city to another; or, of course, leaving the country. Dad was no longer able to do what he felt God had sent him to Japan to do. He needed to get back to America where he could serve God as a minister to some small congregation. But perhaps he had waited too long!

Although exciting and energizing, the process of taking that next big step was to be agonizingly slow and frustrating. He wrote, "The permits are innumerable and they must all go through the Finance Department and it takes time. About a week ago I sent in my permit or rather my request for a permit to sell the rest of our things but no reply yet."

Not only were requests for each permit and the delayed responses a hurdle, but by then there were no ships going from Japan to the U.S. And none coming in. On Sept. 15, he wrote that, not surprisingly, he had received no letters for about four weeks. No boats ... no mail. He could deal with that now that his focus had changed. But he must find a way to cross the ocean. There were a few unscheduled ships going from Shanghai to the U.S. So if he could find passage from Yokohama to Shanghai, he would simply wait there and take his chances.

Yes, he did catch a Japanese boat which he boarded in Shanghai. Since there are no more letters after Sept. 15, I don't know what his sailing or arrival dates were. However, when he wrote that last letter, he had no permits and no way to sell his belongings. He had no knowledge of when he might get to Shanghai or how long he would have to wait to get permits and passage back "home".

I do know this: He caught the last possible ship to make the crossing. The next one was in midocean on December 7, 1941 and reversed its course, returning to Japan. He had narrowly escaped internment.

Dad barely had his feet planted on American soil when he was asked to pastor a church in Fergus Falls, Minnesota just until Spring when a permanent pastor would be assigned. Dad was registered in the Michigan conference, but agreed to fill in where he was needed for those six months. Four years later, I graduated from high school in that cold Minnesota town. He never did pastor a church in Michigan.

That, of course, was not the end of the sacrifices Dad and Mom made for us and others. Each of you can name sacrifices made by your parents as well, perhaps not necessarily as obvious, but equally as significant. Intent on our own challenges, celebrations, and goals, we sometimes fail to notice.


